

Evanston Waste Transfer Station Budget Survey Report

Overview

From August 22, 2016 through September 5, 2016 the City sought public input on the community's priorities for budgeting the roughly \$1.2 million that was awarded to the City in a settlement with Advanced Disposal, the current operator of the Church Street Waste Transfer Station. The purpose of this document is to provide a summary of the results from that survey. City staff will use the survey results and conversations with community members as the basis for budget recommendations to Evanston's City Council to be included in the Fiscal Year 2017 Budget. Methodology

The development and format of the survey were decided upon with recommendations, suggestions and revisions from the Environment Board's Environmental Justice Subcommittee (EJ Subcommittee). The EJ Subcommittee took feedback from a joint 2nd and 5th ward meeting with residents in June, 2016 and developed a set of survey questions based on the feedback collected at that meeting. The EJ Subcommittee then proposed those questions be the basis for a community budget survey. City staff then revised the proposed questions and requested another round of feedback from the EJ Subcommittee. After the final round of feedback the survey was finalized and released for two weeks in late August.

The EJ Subcommittee felt it was important to focus the survey outreach on those with the closest proximity to the waste transfer station. With this in mind significant outreach was conducted, by the EJ Subcommittee, in the neighborhoods adjacent to the facility. In order to analyze these results, City staff has, where possible, analyzed the survey results based on respondent proximity to the waste transfer station. Survey results are based on a total of 472 submitted surveys, 287 online surveys, 179 print surveys, 466 in English and 6 in Spanish. All survey data were aggregated and analyzed as one complete dataset.

Results Summary

The survey consisted of 10 separate questions (see Exhibit II). Individual question summaries are included for questions 1-9. Question 9 includes a list of comments that were submitted by respondents and is included in table format (see Exhibit I) based on proximity to the transfer station. Question 10 is not included because it is respondents' email addresses.

A few examples of the qualitative responses, included in full in Exhibit I, are provided below as examples of people's lived experience of the Waste Transfer Station.

Direct Quotes:

- "Get it ou[t] of our community!"
- "this is the largest environmental justice issue we face in Evanston and the people living close to this station should be the priority in terms of addressing health concerns resulting from the impact of this station"
- "Regular monitoring of the site, so any environmentally noxious discharge can be caught and mitigated"
- "I have been complaining for 30+ years about the facility, I hope NOW the city is serious about fixing this health issue for the citizens. Who wants to live breathing noxious, stinky air everyday? Do you?"
- "A place like this has to go somewhere and the people who live near here made the decision to move there. Things are fine as they are and no more money should go towards changing things."
- "They need to close door when making transfer and use sealed hvac to keep odor and noise down. The smells and sounds are so disruptive to the neighbors. A containment system should be established to reduce both. Testing of surrounding soil, water and air quality sound be done monthly to ensure safety of neighbors, as there are many with young children."

Survey Highlights

Below staff have included a list of different highlights taken out of the results from the survey. These highlights are not necessarily any more important than other findings within the results but they represent apparent trends within the data.

- 96% of those living 2-4 blocks from the station agree with reducing rodents around the station
- 44% of people living more than 7 blocks away said they agree with parking lot improvements
- 20% of all respondents disagreed with community garden, highest level of disagreement
- The vast majority of respondents said they are an Evanston resident (95%)
- 40% say they pass the transfer station on a regular basis

- 60% of respondents said they experienced a bad odor near the station
- 33% said they had seen rodents near or on the waste transfer station property, yet 85% said they agreed with taking action to reduce rodent populations near the station
- Only 16% expressed concern about the facility hours of operation
- 81% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed with developing a process to monitor environmental impacts of the station on the surrounding neighborhood periodically
- 52% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed with improve parking access at local community centers, the lowest agreement for any survey question.
- Interestingly the second lowest agreement was for the development of a community garden which also had the highest disagreement at 21%.

Broadly speaking questions 6 and 7 received significant agreement and support from community members. Each section of the question received at least 65% of respondents agreeing or strongly agreeing. Question 8 saw more variability in support although all five options received more than 50% agreement or strong agreement. There was most support for increasing green space and natural areas, expanding and improving walking and pedestrian infrastructure and improving and expanding park and recreational amenities.

Respondents who lived closer to the waste transfer station indicated in every instance a stronger level of agreement with all options in questions 6, 7 and 8 and listed more negative impacts from the station as demonstrated by responses to questions 2 and 3. Additionally, in question 5 those living closer to the transfer station were more interested, on average, in having a larger portion of funds spent on monitoring and evaluation than those living farther away (7 or more blocks).







Improve or expand parks including recreational amenities such as playgrounds, sports fields and/or a dog park






