REDUCED CONCERTS

Reduce the fixed number of concerts in the ordinance to six per year to balance the need to realistically operate the venue while addressing the concerns of neighbors.

NO MORE UNLIMITED 10K-PERSON EVENTS

No longer asking to modify the original text amendment request that allowed for an unlimited number of 10,000person University events.

LIMIT COMMUNITY-BASED ACTIVITIES

Limit community-based activities at the stadium and plazas to 60 days per year.

Logistics

- Coordinated support vehicle sequencing
- 10-20 trucks loading/unloading underground loading dock
- Tour buses (3-5)
 parked underground
 at loading dock

Management

- Time parameters for sound checks and concert completion
- Sound level restrictions with designated measuring points at source and perimeter of property

Sample Event Schedule

- Day 1 Load in stage/equipment
- Day 2 Concert Day (complete sound checks)
- Day 3 Load out stage/equipment





EVENT TRANSPORTATION CHARACTERISTICS




EVENT TRANSPORTATION CHARACTERISTICS

TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT PLAN

- Operations plan summarizing event transportation logistics
- Developed in coordination with City, Transit Agencies, Police/Security, and other groups
- A dynamic plan:
 - Reviewed together a Community Advisory Group and the City
 - Biannual review
 - Updates responding to changing conditions, technologies, and feedback

Key components include:

- Temporary adjustments to street configurations, directional flows, curbside restrictions, etc.
- Active management and control of traffic signals and intersections by Police
- Shuttle bus routes and stops
- Neighborhood event parking restrictions
- Parking locations and management
- Rideshare staging and pick-up zones
- Directional event wayfinding signage locations and messaging
- Communications

Public Safety Framework To Ensure Efficient 911/EMT Response


Incident Command System – Since 2002, large events at Ryan Field utilize <u>a unified</u> <u>command post</u> which is staffed by representatives from all public safety entities. This Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is active for several hours before and after each event. All event logistical communication flows through the EOC:

- 911 or other calls for service at/from Ryan Field are handled by personnel assigned to the event and are already onsite.
- The community has the same available emergency response resources as a non-event day.
- Evanston and Wilmette Police officers that are posted at and near Ryan Field assist with emergency vehicle access on streets adjacent to Ryan Field

Acoustics - Concert Sound Analysis




- CadnaA Noise Prediction Modeling
 - ISO 9613 Noise modeling standards
 - Pop music frequency spectrum as sound source
 - South endzone stage
 - Empty seats

- Typical concert setup
 - Sound board 100 feet from stage (set at 101 dBA)
 - Speaker system set at 56 feet above field level
 Two main line arrays pointing to the opposite endzone
 - One side fill line array on each side to cover the seating sections along the sidelines near the stage

Acoustics - Regulatory



What?

The A-weighted decibel scale, expressed as "dBA," is typically utilized for environmental sound assessments and regulatory requirements including Occupational Safety & Health Administration (OSHA), the World Health Organization (WHO) and municipality ordinance requirements.



Why?

The A-weighted decibel scale is designed to correct decibel readings to account for the fact that the human ear is less sensitive to low pitched sounds than it is to high pitched sounds and provides a better measure of the subjective response of a human to any given noise.

Future Ryan Field – Text Amendment Summary

Current	Proposed
Unlimited University-sponsored lectures, speakers, musical performances and cultural events of up to 10,000 allowed in an enclosed building	No change
New section	Allow University and City events in the plazas, capped at 7,500 persons and 60 days per year (e.g., movie nights)
Allows certain "temporary events", but only if a certificate of zoning compliance is obtained	Allow "public facing concerts" (subject to restrictions), and eliminate certificate requirement in favor of MOU
Limits attendance at temporary events to 10,000	Allow for concerts up to the facility capacity
Requires "adequate university parking"	Require Traffic Management Plan for concerts
"No more than 7" temporary events in any one facility of up to 5 consecutive days in duration	"No more than 6" concerts within the U2 district
"Tractor trailers may not remain running"	"Vehicles may only idle" in approved areas
New section	Add event hours more restrictive than proposed noise ordinances (10:00 pm on weekdays; 10:15 on weekends/holidays)
New section	"Any uses not outlined herein shall require approval by the City's Special Events Committee."





Consistency with Evanston Comprehensive Plan

"Support the growth and evolution of institutions while recognizing that they are part of their mostly residential surroundings."

"As an objective, the City should work to assure that institutional development enhances surrounding neighborhoods as well as the economic development of Evanston."

"Because businesses, institutions, and housing often sit adjacent to one another in Evanston, ..., the expansion of one land use can cause concern for another. Those buying property adjacent to a different classification of land use should anticipate that the future could bring a change in the scale or nature of activity at that location. Likewise, those intending to develop property adjacent to different zoning districts are encouraged to be sensitive to the impact of their designs, particularly if they will adjoin single-family residential areas."
