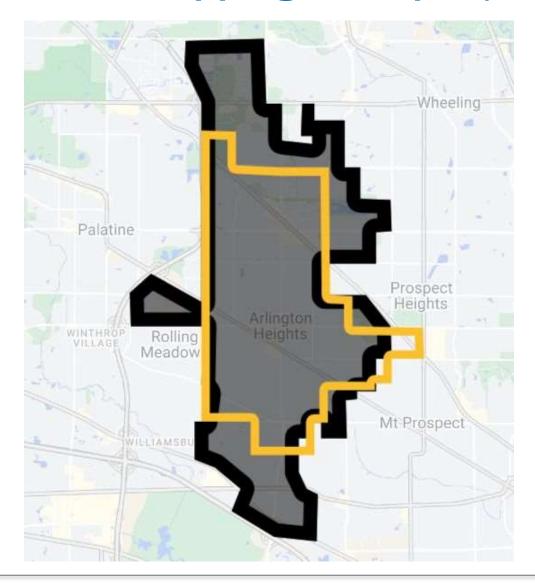


Exhibit 1 - School District Parameters

- Composite is an average of all individual properties; any individual property may be higher or lower than the composite.
- School Districts mostly overlapped one-for-one with communities.
- There are always exceptions in any community; boundary lines aren't perfect!
- Skokie most complicated because of multiple elementary school districts. (Exhibit 3 for details)



Exhibit 1 - Mapping Example (Arlington Heights)

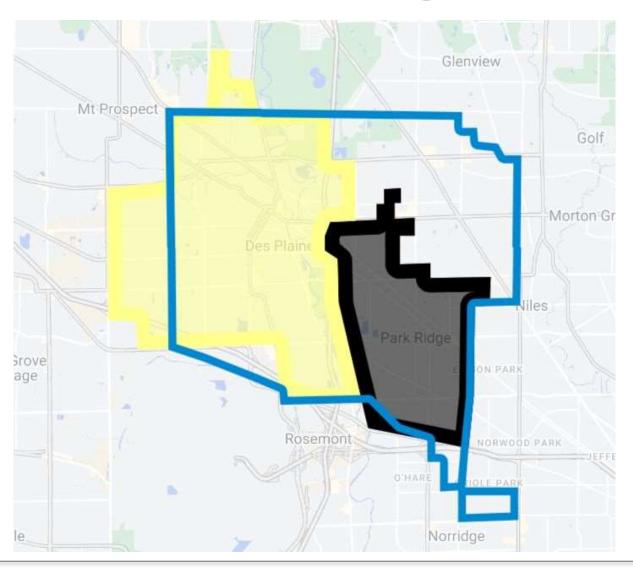

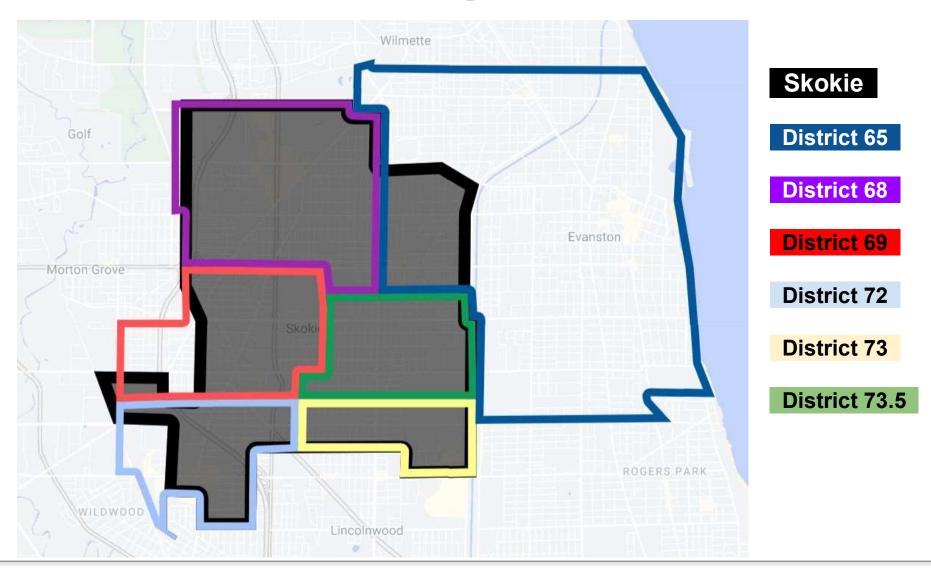




Exhibit 1 - Observations

- Evanston School Districts have among the lowest Property Tax Rates of the all of the School Districts in the Peer Communities (Table 1.2).
- On average, School Districts account for approximately 66% of a property tax bill (Table 1.2).
- On average, School Districts, Municipalities, Libraries, and Park Districts account for approximately 85% of a property tax bill (Table 1.3).
- Proportionate to the Average Composite Tax rate, Evanston Schools + Government make up around the same amount of a property tax bill as the other Peer Communities (Table 1.3).



Exhibit 2 - General Fund Calculations

- For Municipalities, we used General Fund budgets and actuals as described in Adopted Budget Documents.
- For Park Districts, we used budgets and actuals in Corporate/Administrative Fund, Recreation Fund, and Special Recreation/Facilities Funds as described in Adopted Budget Documents and sometimes ACFRs.
 - Staff determined these types of funds approximated the totality of services provided by Evanston's Parks Department and Administrative Services related to Building and Fleet Maintenance of Parks Managed buildings and vehicles.
- Libraries excluded because they are not in the General Fund.
- Fiscal Year 2024/2025 grouped with Fiscal Year 2024, FY 2023/2024 grouped with FY 2023, etc.

Each of said sums of money and the aggregate thereof are deemed necessary by the Board of Park Commissioners of Palatine Park District to defray the necessary expenses and liabilities of the foresaid Park District during the fiscal year beginning the 1st day of January, 2024 and ending the 31st day of December, 2024 for the respective purpose set forth.



Exhibit 2 - Observations

- Evanston has the largest total expense budget and the highest total revenue budget, in some cases twice as much as other Peer Communities (Table 2.1).
- Evanston has the highest General Fund expense budget and revenue budget, but it is much closer in size to the Peer Communities (Table 2.2).
- Evanston has the highest actual General Fund expenses and the highest actual General Fund revenue of the Peer Communities (Table 2.3).
- Evanston has the highest actual General Fund expenses per capita and the highest actual General Fund revenue per capita of the Peer Communities (Table 2.4).



Exhibit 2 - Observations

- When comparing budgeted General Fund revenues and expenses to actual General Fund revenues and expenses in FY 2022, we see the following (Tables 2.5 and 2.6):
 - Evanston received 21.2% more actual revenues than budgeted revenue in FY 2022.
 - All Peer Communities received more actual revenues than budgeted revenues in FY 2022, on average by 18.6%
 - Evanston spent 1.2% less actual expenses than budgeted expenses in FY 2022.
 - Three Peer Communities spent more than budgeted in FY 2022, and five communities (including Evanston) spent less than budgeted in FY 2022. Those that overspent, did so on average by 13.9%. Those that underspent, did so on average by 4.0%.
